## Book Review Assignment Writing Tips

The main purpose of a book review is to analyze the content of the book and to prove to your audience that you have reflected on what you read and how the material was presented. There are many ways to write a book review. Again, for simplicity's sake, organize your paper into three parts.

### Part 1: Introduction

Begin your review with a bibliographic entry.

- 1) Title, Author, Subject, Length, and Publication Date
- 2) Summarize the book.

## Part 2: Summary of the Content (Include the following)

- 1) Describe how the book is organized.
- 2) What is the theme of the book? In other words, what is the main idea?
- 3) Is the author attempting to make an argument? If so, what is the argument and how does he or she support it?
- 4. What is the thesis? The thesis is a statement of the author's point of view with regard to the subject matter.
- 5. Describe the writer's style. Was it formal or informal?
- 6. Assess the quality of the writing.

## Part 3: Evaluation of the Book

- 1. Examine author's particular bias or point of view. Did the author have an agenda or purpose for writing the book?
- 2. Why did the author write the book? Who is the targeted audience?
- 3. Did the book affect you at all? Did it challenge any preconceived notion you had on the subject matter?

- 4. Was the author convincing in his/her arguments? Provide evidence from the book to support your conclusion.
- 5. What special interest group in American society would agree or disagree with the author's thesis at the time of the first publication? Explain.
- 6. In your opinion, is this a well written book? Would you recommend the book to anyone? Explain.
- 7. What did you learn from this book that helps you better understand American History? How have your opinion about the topic changed as a result of reading the book?
- 8. Were the topics and themes discussed in the book still relevant today in American society? Explain.
- 9. What does the book reveal about life in the United States at the time it was written?
- 10. What possibilities does the book suggest? What matters does the book leave out? Explain.
- 11. If you were given the opportunity to ask the author two questions about the book, what two questions would you ask?
