Academic Honesty: Plagiarism is the unauthorized, uncited use of another person's words and/or ideas. Cheating includes copying; sharing; and using "cheat sheets" or other written, verbal, or electronic information which is not your own. Both are illegal, and neither is tolerated in my classroom or at PAHS. Any such activity will result in receiving a zero any assignment that represents the use of plagiarism.

Midterm and Final Exams: The midterm and final exams do count toward your final

average for the year. So take them seriously!

Homework: The nature of this course mandates that a fair amount of work be done outside the classroom; these assignments will be categorized as Projects/Writing Assignments/Homework. If you are not present in the class, you must hand in the homework and any other assignments the following class period. (Remember this does not apply to essays only homework assignments). If you are absent you must see me for the work you missed, on the day of your return. I will not come to you. You are expected to be an active participant in class, and you can only do so by being prepared (with all supplies, books, and completed work) each and every day.

Rules and Regulations:

- 1. Please be in your seat working on the "Do Now" when the bell rings.
- 2. Please bring appropriate thoughts, materials, and language to class (cursing is for those who do not know how to properly express themselves and failure to speak properly will not be tolerated).

- 5. Show respect for the teacher, your classmates and the classroom.
