

Faith Ringgold, 1930-


- Born in the Harlem neighborhood of New York City during the Harlem Renaissance Movement.

- Faith wrote 30 stories on quilts in memory of her mother as well as many children's books.




Alma Thomas, 1891–1978


- After working in art education for several years, Alma Thomas enrolled at Howard University in Washington, DC to study costume design.




Romare Bearden, 1911-1988

- Romare Bearden graduated from New York University (NYU) with a degree in education.
- Bearden's primary medium was the collage, fusing painting, magazine clippings, old paper and fabric, like a jigsaw puzzle in upheaval.
- He is known for textured collages using jazz, folklore, and his culture. Two of his collages appeared on the covers of *Fortune* and *Time* magazines, in 1968.

Jacob Lawrence, 1917-2000

A celebrated painter, storyteller, and interpreter of the African-American experience, Jacob Lawrence was born in Atlantic City, New Jersey in 1917.

- He showed contemporary scenes of African-American urban life as well as historical events. He used crisp shapes, bright, clear colors and dynamic patterns.
- Lawrence was a painter and art educator.
- In his later career he was also known for his serigraphs (silkscreens).

Gilliam, an African American, is associated with the Washington Color School, a group of Washington, D.C. artists that developed a form of abstract art from color field painting in the 1950s and 1960s.

He works on stretched, draped and wrapped canvas, and adds sculptural 3D elements.

- First African American elected to National Academy









- became an Olympic gold medalist in 1960 and the world heavyweight boxing champion in 1964.
- reclaimed the heavyweight title two more times during the 1970s, against Joe Frazier and George Foreman along the way.

JACKIE ROBINSON



- The first African-American to play in Major League Baseball.
- April 15th is celebrated as Jackie Robinson Day in Major League Baseball.
- He played for the Brooklyn Dodgers at Ebbets Field in Brooklyn, New York.
- In 1962 Jackie Robinson was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame.

OPRAH WINFREY



- Anchored the news at Nashville's WTVF-TV when she was just 19, making her the youngest person and the first African-American woman to hold the position
- In 2013, Winfrey was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom (the nation's highest civilian honor) by President Barack Obama.
- She started her own production company called Harpo Productions. "Harpo" is Oprah spelled backwards.

FORMER PRESIDENT BARACK OBAMA



- Most famous for being the first African American President of the United States
- Graduated from Harvard Law School in 1991
- Served on the Illinois state senate until 2004 when he was elected to the United States Senate.
- He likes to play basketball and is an avid sports fan. His favorite teams are the Chicago Bears for football and the Chicago White Sox for baseball


